Pastel Sticks for Portraits

You will need a set of pastel sticks (essential) Here are some options. You can use any pastels for portraits. I do use some specific skin coloured pastels (the Unison Portrait Set) but I also use any colours that work.



IF YOU ALREADY HAVE OTHER PASTEL BRANDS THEN PLEASE USE THOSE FIRST





My preferred pastel brand is Unison Colour.

Pastel Pencils for Portraits

Pastel pencils (essential). I have found that the brands that lean more towards portraits are Faber Castell and Caran D'Ache. I've compiled this list as an idea to what you would need for portraits but as all skin varies this is by no means an exhaustive list and not prescriptive.

White 101 (Faber Castell)

Cream 103 (Faber Castell)

Warm Grey IV 273 (Faber Castell)

Cobalt Blue 143, Dark Indigo157 (Faber Castell)

Venetian 190, Indian Red 192, (Faber Castell)

Caput Mortum 169 (Faber Castell)

Burnt Ochre 187, Brown Ochre 182, Burnt Sienna 283 (Faber Castell)

Walnut Brown 177 or 176, Raw Umber 180, Dark Sepia 175 (Faber Castell)

Chromium Green Opaque 174 (Faber Castell)

Pink Carmine 127 (Faber Castell) or 335 (Carbothello)

Medium Flesh 131, Light Flesh 132, Cinnamon 189 (Faber Castell)

Dark Chrome Yellow 109 (Faber Castell) OR Indian Yellow 215 (Carbothello)

Payne's Grey 770 (Carbothello) Deep violet colour!

Caput Mortum Violet Light 642 (Carbothello)

Old Rose Dark 471 36 Creta Color and Violet Oxide P240 Derwent (not essential)

Other Pastel Pencil Brands

As you grow your collection of pastel pencils you may want to invest in Caran D'ache pastel pencils which are very soft and have some excellent skin colours:



Pan Pastels

Pan Pastels (not essential) My method teaches you how to use the Pan Pastel Sofft tools with soft pastel sticks. So it is fine to use Pan Pastels with this course if you prefer.

Pan Pastel have a portrait set, here is the colour list:





Sofft Tools



Sofft Tools (essential) are like palette knives with sponges on the end. I find them really useful for portraits. The triangular shaped tool especially because of the pointy tip. Or the oval one.

Pastel Paper

I recommend Pastelmat card made by Clairefontaine. You can buy 50x70cm single sheets of dark grey (which is actually mid grey) and cut them to size or half and quarter sheets. I recommend quarter sheet size (24cm x 32cm) for beginners. Other good colours are brown, pale blue, dark green and brown.

I don't recommend the pastelmat pads (same product just in a pad) because the colour combinations aren't always suitable for portraits. But some people just prefer pads, so the choice is yours.

Other paper that is good to practice on and inexpensive is wet and dry paper 1000 or 1200 grit from the hardware store.

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Tools

- Tortillon Blenders (essential)
- Rubber Blender (not essential)
- Triangular Sofft Tool (essential)
- Crank handle sharpener OR knife and sand paper (essential)
- Sand paper (80 or 100 grit) to clean tortillon blenders and sharpening pencils (essential)
- Kneadable eraser (essential)

Transfer Paper

If you're drawing skills need practice you can use transfer paper to transfer your image to the pastel paper. I use graphite paper as I have found this to be the best. Here are some options:

- Graphite Paper (my preference) from www.myartscape.org or Amazon
- Tracedown from most art shops or Amazon
- Carbon Paper from Amazon. Cheaper than graphite but hard to rub out.
